CHAIRMAN'S INTRODUCTION

This Newsletter is the first from the new Thorner Parish Council, elected in May 2023 following applications received from within the community. I would like to welcome and thank the two new councillors, Angela Wallis and Catherine Wilson, for their determination to further contribute their time and knowledge. I also wish to acknowledge and congratulate the three other Councillors forming the team, returning to their roles unopposed, Rosamund Brittain, Sheila Llewellyn and Tom Mycock.

I have made a personal commitment to support change and to improve the connections between the Council and the village. The Parish Council is currently rolling out a new website format. The goal is to allow easier access to updates and information related to the village and surrounding areas, and to share the agenda and meeting minutes of the Parish Council.

All agenda and minutes of the parish council are published on our web site www.thornerpc. uk and are the main means of the parish council communicating our actions and decisions to residents of Thorner. The meetings are at 7pm on the first Tuesday of the month at the Bungalow and I would encourage anyone to attend the meeting who wishes to see how the council works. The first 15 minutes of each meeting are given to public representations. In accordance with national guidelines for parish councils, members of the public are limited to 5 minutes to make comments. It is advised that members of the public contact the Clerk advance, to alert the council of the wish to speak and therefore be prioritised to talk after the initial meeting introductions and formalities. Thereafter, the Council meeting will resume and during this period, standing orders do not permit interference or other comment from members of the public.

The Parish Council will continue to occasionally post on the Thorner Facebook page to remind or refer the public to the new website. However, we

will no longer comment or respond to comments within social media. This is not the correct forum to engage or respond to observations posted therein. At times, posts have been incorrect or not factually based and to respond directly, individually may be inappropriate, potentially inferring official council policy or position. The definitive response will be published within the meeting minutes or directly to individual correspondence by email where applicable and appropriate.

Leeds Festival at Bramham Park is approaching. This magazine contains a copy of the information from Festival Republic relating to the event, including but not limited to road closures and the bus from Thorner to Bramham park and return. Thorner Parish Council is represented at meetings by a councillor and therefore is the best place to communicate the concerns of the village to the organisers. We will stay in touch over any issues that are brought to our attention.

We also want to remind residents that it is the Thorner Community Fund who organise the bus from Thorner to the festival and e-ticket distribution, and not the Parish Council. Contact details of the festival organisers in case of issues or complaints are published in the relevant article. We wish everyone, a safe and enjoyable LeedsFest and look ahead to potentially sunnier/dryer days.

My Chairman's report, presents a record of the achievements of the former council, highlighting what contributions have been made to benefit the village. I urge you to refer to this and learn about how this busy council continues to work on maintaining the village and surrounding area. We are looking for new Councillors to return the Council to its full strength - please read the article from the Clerk.

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DEFIBRILLATORS IN THORNER

Thorner is in the enviable position as a small village, to have three community accessible defibrillators. These are housed at the rear of the Victory Hall, outside The Fox Public house and also at the top of Church Hill in a repurposed red telephone kiosk.

When dialling 999, in situations requiring use of a defibrillator (e.g., suspected cardiac arrest), the emergency operator will direct callers to the nearest available defibrillator and provide the access code. The unit is then out of action and will not be returned to use until the equipment is inspected and replacement pads or other accessories are replenished.

I am aware that some organisations have the code on display in their facility. **Even if you** know the code, it is irresponsible to remove a defibrillator before you call 999, 'just in case'.

Other callers may be directed to a defibrillator cabinet, having already called for help, only to find that the equipment has been removed.

This action can put lives in danger.

The two defibrillators on Church Hill and at The Fox are managed by the Parish Council, which includes the purchase of replacement adhesive pads and batteries ahead of expiry dates. These devices are the same type as used by Yorkshire Ambulance Service Community First Responders (see photograph).

The equipment, once opened, guides the user through steps for use and instructs when to perform cardio-pulmonary resuscitation (rescue breaths and chest compression). It only instructs the application of an electric shock when the electrical activity of the heart indicates that this is required.

Individuals have mentioned at prior Council meetings, that they had questions about using such equipment. Most people have never seen the equipment and few people have exposure to it in emergency situations, so there are understandable fears, concerns and doubts about what would happen if called upon to use a defibrillator.

Yorkshire Ambulance Service (YAS) can provide an information session. These last around one hour to explain what happens when you dial 999, how the call is triaged and how a defibrillator is accessed if required. They also bring a training defibrillator and manikin to show how a defibrillator works, how to check if a person is or isn't breathing and how to do CPR.

Thorner Parish Council will arrange a session, funding this on behalf of the village, subject to YAS trainer availability and a location being identified and booked.

Our intent it to offer a session for up to 30 residents, on a first come, first served basis. Further sessions may be arranged, subject to availability, as stated above.

THORNER FOOTPATH VOLUNTEERS

Walkers and runners who regularly use the Carr Lane/ Scarborough Walk route will have noticed the mowing in early July of the new path parallel to Carr Lane (done by Leeds City Council contractors), and the rebuilding of the retaining wall on the Scarborough Walk by the landowner, Mexborough Estates.

Excavations for the wall were disrupted by a large rock, resulting in a recess being created in the gabions to incorporate it.

A bench has already been installed further along the path in earlier works to replace one that was crushed when the old wall collapsed. There is a suggestion of a second bench being created to go in the new recess.

It's a lovely spot to sit, enjoy the view, watch the buzzards and kites, to unwind and reflect for a while.

The Mexborough Estates have agreed to a bench being installed in there.

Does anyone have any ideas for the design and construction of a simple bench that would blend into the recess? Perhaps someone would be willing to fund a bench, or make a donation, design or build one?

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VACANCIES ON THE PARISH COUNCIL

Thorner Parish Council comprises of 9 members. It has a statutory duty to employ a Clerk / Responsible Financial Officer, who is its only part-time employee.

The Parish Council is a legal entity and a local authority that makes decisions on behalf of the people in the parish and has an overall responsibility for the well-being of its local community.

It is the level of government closest to the community, with the district authority above it in the hierarchy. As it is the authority closest to the people, Parish Councils are often the first place that people contact with concerns or ideas.

For this reason, they are a vital part of the community.

Its work falls into three main categories:

- Representing the local community
- Delivering services to meet local needs.
- Striving to maintain and improve the quality of life in the parish.

Why become a Parish Councillor?

If you've never been to a Parish Council meeting before, you may be forgiven for thinking that Parish Councillors are just a group of senior people who meet now and then in a draughty village hall. If, however, you live in a community where something 'big' has happened, you'll know that when people in the community need support and guidance, it is sometimes the Parish Council that is turned to.

How much time does it take up?

The Council meets once a month to which members of the public are also invited.

Meetings may last two or three hours, depending on the content of the agenda.

In addition to the regular meetings, Councillors are occasionally required to attend other meetings representing the council, for example acting as a representative on an outside body, community activities or helping develop a new project for the community.

How long does a Parish councillor serve for?

Once elected, Parish Councillors sit on the council for a maximum of four years.

If you wish to remain a Parish Councillor you can stand for re-election.

By becoming a Parish Councillor, you become someone your community will look to for help, guidance and support a community leader with the power to influence decisions for the benefit of the people you serve. Seeing your community change for the better, because of decisions you have helped make, is something that can give you a sense of achievement and pride.

Although the Parish Council has limited powers to make decisions beyond what they are responsible for, they do have the ability to negotiate with, and the power to influence, organisations that do make the final decisions such as the many Leeds City Council Departments.

The Parish Council therefore invites individuals with an interest in their community to consider applying for a position on the Council.
